About Us

Equestrian Western Australia (EWA) is the state sporting organisation for equestrian sports. The organisation was established in 1951 with the support of Equestrian Australia, the national equestrian sporting body, and the Royal Agricultural Society. EWA has successfully operated as an organisation for over 60 years and is the custodian for many horse sports in Western Australia (WA), including Dressage, Para-Equestrian, Eventing, Jumping, Show Horse and Vaulting.

EWA is administered in Western Australia by a Board of Directors, a Chief Executive Officer, a small team of administration staff, and various discipline committees. EWA is sustained mainly by hard-working and dedicated volunteers, including committee members, officials, event organisers and helpers at events. Our roles and responsibilities include:

- Serve individual members and clubs.
- Implement and develop rules, policies, processes and systems.
- Provide education, development opportunities, support and financial assistance to elite riders through the High Performance Pathway.
- Contribute to developing the next generation of equestrians through youth-specific development programs and events.
- Provide education and training to riders, coaches and officials.
- Promote and advocate for horse sport in WA.
- Regulate and increase participation in equestrian activities in WA.
- Operate the State Equestrian Centre in Brigadoon as the "Home of Equestrian Sport in WA".

Chair's Report

2023 has been a successful year with plenty of accomplishments and achievements in the sport. The Board, the Committees, and Equestrian WA (EWA) Staff, are committed to progressing equestrian sport in WA to deliver the best experience possible for our community.

There are several exciting things happening to build these foundations which includes:

- Making significant improvements to our High-Performance program, giving us the best opportunity to enable our local talent to pursue their dreams of Olympic glory, with a particular focus on Brisbane 2032.
- Major improvements and upgrades to the State Equestrian Centre (SEC), including surfaces and facilities. The SEC is always a key focus for EWA, and we want our sport's home to be as welcoming and inclusive as possible.
- New commercial and revenue opportunities through the development of long-standing partnerships, providing increased benefits and value to all EWA members.

Another satisfying achievement in 2023 was the review with the Australian Sport Commission on Sports Governance Standards. EWA results exceeded the State, National and Equestrian Averages. EWA's average score was 3 out of 4 for all Sport Governance Standards, the State Average is 2.91, the National Average is 2.66 and the Equestrian Average is 2.75.

EWA excelled in the following areas:

- **Principle 2 The team** aligned sport through collaborative governance.
- **Principle 3 The gameplan** a clear vision that informs strategy.
- Principle 5 The rulebook documents

that outline duties, powers, roles, and responsibilities.

• **Principle 9 The scorecard** - embedded systems of internal review to foster continuous improvement.

The board election was held in November; Rory Hovell returning as Vice Chair and Roslyn O'Halloran has been appointed again as the Finance Director. Geoff Edwards, PollyAnn Huntington and Alexander Daniels continue their roles on the board and all board members expertise are appreciated. Kelly Kent has been appointed to the board in December 2023 and her communications and governance skills are important and beneficial for our sport.

The board acknowledges CEO of EWA, Zac Acott's tremendous work and contributions. Zac has been in the role for two years (by mid-May 2024) and his energy and enthusiasm is captivating to all. The board is very appreciative of his commitment and dedication.

The board wishes to thank the Department of Local Government, Sport, and Cultural Industries for their continued financial and organisational support that has been critical to the survival of the sport in WA. They have been actively involved in helping move EWA forward.

Our members are our most valuable asset; as CEO, I assure you that the EWA Board, Sport Committees, and EWA Staff are committed to the long-term journey ahead, ensuring the best experience for our community and continuous improvements for our sport.

EWA would like to thank Off the Track WA (OTTWA) and Racing and Wagering Western Australia (RWWA) for their continued support of not only of Equestrian WA as our principal partner; but the wider equestrian community through their community grants and events partnerships.

We also saw tremendous growth in our partnership portfolio, securing the support of many new sponsors, enabling us to put funds back into the development of equestrian sport and the State Equestrian Centre.

State Equestrian Centre

The State Equestrian Centre (SEC) continued to see a lot of activity in 2023, with a full calendar of competitions and clinics, hosting many great events including the State Dressage Championships, 50th Anniversary Show Horse of the Year, Christopher Bartle Clinics and Masterclass, WASJA Patrons Cup, Horseland Young Horse Championships, Perth Showjumping League, and FEI WAYER.

2023 also saw a lot of improvements around the SEC, highlighted by the re-surfacing of the Indoor Arena and Indoor Warm Up Area. On Friday 28 April, the SEC launched the new Indoor Arena Surface with a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony featuring the EWA Board and CEO, Jessica Shaw MLA, Lisa Baker MLA and Hon. Samantha Rowe MLC. After the formal proceedings of the ribbon-cutting ceremony, the \$3,000 Invitational Jumping Grand Prix commenced featuring some of WA's top Show Jumping Talents. Between 400-500 patrons attended the event, in what is the start of a new chapter in the history of the SEC. Thank you to all those who attended the evening.

The year also saw new LED lighting installed in the Indoor Arena and Pavilion, Solar Panels installed on the roof of the SEC, Water Tanks and Fire Hydrants installed to assist in fire prevention and works on the GP Fields to get the grassed arena to a higher standard. The aim of Equestrian WA is to continue to provide the best facility we can within the limitations of our finances.

Thank you again to the State Government through the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries for their support of the SEC through funding opportunities to continue to improve this great facility. Without this vital support, projects at the SEC cannot be achieved.

Equestrian WA would also like to thank City of Swan Councillors Rod Henderson and Charlie Zannino for their support of the SEC.

Junior Equestrian Development Squad (JEDS)

The Maitland Park Junior Equestrian Development Squad (JEDS) was established in 2023 replacing the 2022 Rising Stars program. 2023 saw the JEDS squad comprise of 28 dedicated riders aged 11 to 17, the squad demonstrated exceptional commitment to their equestrian pursuits.

Throughout the year, the squad participated in a series of intensive clinics aimed at enhancing their riding skills and equestrian knowledge. These sessions were pivotal in preparing them for the challenges of the High-Performance Program, providing them with the tools necessary to excel in competitive equestrian sports. Under the guidance of experienced coaches and with the unwavering support of Maitland Park, the squad members displayed tremendous growth both as riders and individuals. Their passion for equestrianism was evident in their dedication to learning and improvement, setting a strong foundation for their future endeavours in the sport.

Overall, 2023 was a year of significant progress and achievement for the Equestrian WA Junior Equestrian Development Squad, highlighting their potential for success in the years to come.


2023 Saddles Plus Interschool Equestrian State Championships

The 2023 Saddles Plus State Interschool Championships was held from April 19th to 22nd at the State Equestrian Centre, Brigadoon. Embraced by idyllic weather conditions, the event commenced with an Opening Parade on the inaugural day, setting the stage for an enthralling four (4) days of competition. With participation from Primary and Secondary Schools across WA, the event witnessed a remarkable assembly of 158 riders mounted on 177 horses, encompassing nearly 588 classes.

Featuring a diversified schedule of five (5) disciplines and supported by a substantial contingent of parent volunteers, dedicated officials, and enthusiastic volunteers, the championships showcased an array of activities over the course of four eventful days. Amidst the fervour, the occurrence of the Eclipse posed logistical challenges, yet was navigated adeptly.

A culminating Awards Ceremony held at the State Equestrian Centre in the ensuing weeks celebrated the achievements of winners and runners-up across various disciplines, along with the honour bestowed upon Champion Teams. Supported by Saddles Plus, the ceremony saw the presentation of rosettes, trophies, garlands, and prizes. Additionally, attendees were treated to delectable cupcakes adorned with a clever Interschools icing logo.

Noteworthy mentions include Ruby Rae from Australian Christian College, crowned as the



Champion Secondary Rider, and Ruby Gilberd from Mother Teresa Catholic College, clinching the title of Champion Primary Rider. Australian Christian College emerged triumphant once more, securing the overall School Award, while Margaret River Senior High School claimed the Rural School award. Furthermore, the WA State Squad was announced as well as Corien Ridley as Team Manager.

The spirit of competition extended beyond state borders, as Team WA comprised of 25 talented competitors travelled to represent WA at the Marcus Oldham National Interschool Championships in Werribee. Amongst them, veterans and newcomers alike showcased their prowess, with nine (9) horses traversing the expanse of the Nullarbor. Notably, the provision of competitive pool horses by Victoria bolstered WA's performance, culminating in standout achievements such as Imogen Freeman's victory in the National Senior Show Horse category, earning her the distinction of Overall Show Horse Rider of the Nationals.

The Interschools platform serves as a pivotal pathway for high-performance equestrian endeavours, with many competitors progressing to achieve State and National accolades in their riding careers, signifying a promising future for equestrian sports.

The success of the Interschool Equestrian State Championships owes much to the exceptional support extended by sponsors, including Saddles Plus, Off the Track WA, the Department of Sport, Local Government and Cultural Industries, Lotterywest, and Careers in Racing. Their unwavering commitment ensures the continued growth and vitality of equestrian pursuits in our region.



Off the Track WA



In 2023, Off the Track WA and Equestrian WA hosted 15 clinics, providing essential support for 604 horses transitioning from racing careers. These clinics facilitated 1258 lessons, focusing on rehabilitation, retraining, and growing the education of these riders and horses.

The clinics attracted a diverse group of participants, including horse owners, trainers, and enthusiasts, fostering a community dedicated to the welfare of retired racehorses. Through educational workshops, practical demonstrations, and hands-on training, the clinics emphasized the importance of proper care, education, and training techniques for these horses' successful transition. Clinics were held across the state including Capel, Murray, Northam and Geraldton. Also including clinics held at the State Equestrian Centre and clubs south of the river.



Off the Track Clinics offer a variety of lessons including:

- Groundwork where riders learn how to safely educate their horses about manners and responsivity to aids.
- Flatwork to teach horses to become calm, supple, loose and flexible but also confident, attentive and keen.
- Jumping lessons where riders have the opportunity to train from poles through to full courses.
- Cross Country lessons for horses to gain experience in an open environment and different terrains as well as training over solid cross country jumps.
- Social Rides where horses can walk or trot through trail paths in a group being led by local members.

The wonderful coaches' commitment to excellence was reflected in the positive feedback from attendees, who praised the clinics' organisation, content, and impact on their understanding and approach to rehoming racehorses. Looking ahead, Off the Track WA and Equestrian WA aim to expand its reach and impact, continuing to be a vital resource for the racing industry and horse welfare advocates.

Coaches



The 2023 season was a vibrant and dynamic period for the Western Australian equestrian community, marked by remarkable achievements and significant developments across both onhorse and off-horse perspectives. As the Coaching Committee, we are pleased to provide an overview of the season's key highlights, successes, and plans for the future.

Throughout the season, our equestrian community witnessed exceptional performances and memorable moments at key events. These events served as platforms for athletes to showcase their skills, determination, and passion for the sport. Notably, the 2023 EWA Awards Night held at The Ritz-Carlton Perth was a momentous occasion where outstanding individuals were recognised for their contributions.

At the forefront of these accolades was Philippa Collier, a dedicated member of the EWA Coaching Committee, who was honoured as the Coach of the Year. Philippa's unwavering commitment to coaching excellence and mentorship has left an indelible mark on our community, inspiring both athletes and fellow coaches alike.

A significant opportunity presented itself for coaches to attend the Christopher Bartle High Performance clinic as observers. This immersive experience provided invaluable insights into high-level coaching techniques and strategies, empowering coaches to enhance their practices and elevate performance standards within their respective disciplines.

From an off-horse perspective, the 2023 season was characterised by key developments and

achievements aimed at advancing coach education and support. The Coaching Committee successfully delivered the annual coaching update for currently registered EA coaches, ensuring that coaches remained informed and equipped with the latest knowledge and techniques to support their athletes effectively.

Collaboration with the High-Performance team resulted, with coaching opportunities integrated into squad clinics, including the involvement of Christopher Bartle. This collaborative approach maximised coaching effectiveness and enriched the development pathways for aspiring athletes, fostering a culture of continuous improvement and excellence within the equestrian community.

The Coaching Committee led positive changes and impacts throughout the season, driven by a commitment to excellence and innovation. A significant milestone was achieved through the expansion of the committee with the appointment of three new members. These appointments, filling co-opted and sports discipline positions, brought a diverse range of skills and perspectives to the committee, enriching its capacity to support and guide the coaching community effectively.

Furthermore, a positive working relationship was developed with the High Performance team, laying the foundation for continued collaboration to involve coaches in squad clinics featuring international coaches. This partnership not only enhanced coaching experiences but also fostered stronger connections between different segments of the equestrian community, driving collective progress and success.

Achievements and Acknowledgements

The 2023 EWA Annual Awards celebrated outstanding individuals within the coaching community, with Philippa Collier receiving recognition as Coach of the Year - Community Club and in addition, Sonja Johnson was honoured as the Coach of the Year – High Performance, underscoring her exceptional coaching prowess and dedication to excellence.

In a significant milestone for coach education, Liz Tollarzo and Sonja Johnson embarked on their Level 3 Coach course, marking the first such course held by EA in 13 years. Dressage



The priorities of the Dressage WA (DWA) Committee in 2023 were to support and foster our clubs in their event organisation, continue with education of our judges and stewards, and to continue promoting education, training and competition at all levels. With new committee members joining an already strong team we were able to put forward new financial incentive packages for our clubs, develop a new way forward for our leaderboard awards and host one of the most successful State Dressage Championships in Western Australia. There is NO sport that operates in this day and age without either private or governmental support. Our sport is no exception. For us to run more competitions, arrange master classes, clinics and overcome difficulties we face by our geographical isolation, means that our reliance on sponsors has become increasingly imperative.

Nationally, 2023 saw the introduction of new EA Dressage tests from Preparatory through to Advanced level. With the support from Dressage Judges Taskforce and clubs we were able to provide educational opportunities through workshops, judge training seminars and ridden training and protocol days to enable both riders and judges the opportunity to become familiar with these new tests. Through this process, it was evident that online scoring was the only way forward for our state. To provide a more sustainable future for the sport, DWA purchased 11 tablets to be used at DWA and club events for scribes and judges. Huge thanks must go to; Terrina Fairbrother, supported by Julie Millet who have been instrumental in the implementation of the live scoring system state wide. Many hours have been dedicated to the

training and education of riders, judges, scribes and event organisers to keep this a smooth process.

Our Para Equestrian Showcase was run by our PE Dressage Committee Elaine Greene, Val Mayger, Lisa Baker, Sharon Jarvis and Suzin Wells.

Locally, our WA Dressage community were fortunate enough to have British Dressage Rider, Trainer and Judge Peter Storr facilitating a Young Horse Masterclass and Masters of Dressage Symposium organised by Elaine Greene and DJTF. High Performance Squad Riders and riders with top scores from the State Dressage Championships were selected to ride in the clinic and were subsequently selected to be demonstration riders for these masterclasses. This provided a unique and fabulous educational series for riders of all levels from our grass roots riders starting on young horses through to our elite FEI riders. Both the Friday night and Sunday masterclasses were well attended by an enthusiastic crowd whose feedback was extremely positive.

The 2023 Horseland Young Horse Championships was a great success. Showcasing all Olympic disciplines, it is a unique way to bring our sport and community together. Cheryl Campbell, Trudi Hall, Graeme Dick, Celeste Burns and their support team ran a fabulous event and Dressage feel very lucky to have been included in the last two (2) years. Hosting both FEI official and unofficial young horse classes allowed more riders to participate and be a part of this event. Our FEI Young Horse qualifier was won by Tayla Heath on Glenhill Venezio who qualified for the PSI Dressage with the Stars, National Young Dressage Horse Championship in 2024. The Champion of Champions sponsored by Bates Saddles was won by G Star and Gemma Davis.

To round off the competition year, DWA hosted The Invitational and The Rising Star Final proudly supported by Penny Hill Park. This event was run by Heidi Emery and her fabulous support team. Riders were required to qualify throughout the year at specific events and perform the highest level test under an esteemed panel of judges. Two of these judges were FEI judges - Susie Hoevenaars and Connie Bookless who travelled from the Eastern States. Our Rising Star Final has been generously supported by Michelle James of Penny Hill Park for many years. Our thanks goes to Michelle for her ongoing support of our young horses and breeding programs here in WA. This event showcased our young horse combinations who were in their first year of competitive dressage. Our overall Champion was G Star, owned and ridden by Gemma Davis. Our Pony Champion was won by Tiimli Enthusiast, owned and ridden by Lyla Valuri.



WA was represented by Alinta Veenvliet and Desperanza at National & International level this year. Alinta did WA proud with some impressive performances at The Sydney CDI, Willinga Park Dressage by the Sea CDI, NSW State Dressage Championships, PSI Dressage & Jumping with the Stars and the Australian Dressage Championships. Particularly exciting that Alinta and Desperanza have been long listed for the Paris Olympics.

Of immediate importance outside of the competition arena is the need to set protocols and guidelines to facilitate proper management of the funds at our disposal. The development of the sport is of course our primary goal. A key income stream for DWA is the Dressage Development Fund (DDF) level, which is paid by riders when a horse or pony enters an Equestrian Australia approved Dressage Event. In 2023, this fund raised \$22,159 which is a incredible increase from the previous year. This money goes straight back into the sport along with any additional funding from DWA.

In 2023, these funds were expended on the following activities:

- Judge education, training and examinations
- Steward training and education
- Club Competition Incentive Package
- The Invitational Final
- Leaderboard & State Awards
- Peter Storr Masterclass and Symposium

Looking towards 2024, DWA have highlighted several key aspects of the sport to support including both events and funding. DWA currently fund the education and training of dressage stewards and judges who are pivotal to our sport. In 2024, the funds put to this training and development will be increased to support the upgrading of judges to A, B and young horse level. There will also be additional funds put towards the training and education of our local stewards. On the competition front, DWA will be introducing WA's first Youth Dressage Festival being held in April. This will be the first time an event in WA will run the FEI Youth tests which are used both Nationally and Internationally. It will be an exciting event that we hope to build and develop in future years, providing an important building block for our young riders to develop and work towards competing at the National Youth Dressage Championships and CDI competitions on the East Coast.

Eventing



The 2023 Eventing WA season was characterised by outstanding performances, notable achievements, and significant developments both on and off the horse. As we reflect on the season's highlights, it's evident that the dedication and talent within our equestrian community continue to shine brightly.

The season kicked off with a spectacular start at the first FEI event of the year at WAYER, where Kenya Wilson's victory aboard Sandros Salute MW in the CCI4* set the tone for what would be a remarkable year. Kenya's continued success, including participation in the 2023 Oceania Competition in Hastings NZ, solidified her position as a standout performer with eyes set on Paris 2024.

At the 2023 Adelaide Equestrian Festival, WA riders made their mark with impressive performances across various categories. Notable achievements included Kenya Wilson's fourth-place finish in the CCI5* and strong showings from Will Baxter, Mia Mercuri, Riley Lyall, and Natalie Hibbert in the CCI3*. WA officials PollyAnn Huntington and Penny Dodd also played crucial roles, further showcasing the depth of talent within our community.

A highlight of the season was the formation of a WA Team to participate in the Melbourne 3DE, with all riders delivering exceptional performances. Sonja Johnson's victory in the CCI4L at Wooroloo further exemplified the calibre of talent within our region, while Will Baxter's success in the 4S category underscored his growing prominence in the sport. Special mention goes to Ellie Gough for her multiple wins throughout the season, demonstrating skill and determination in every competition.

From an off-horse perspective, the 2023 season saw key developments aimed at advancing the infrastructure and support systems for Eventing in WA. The annual TD CD Seminar held at Murray Equestrian Centre provided valuable insights and training opportunities for aspiring officials, with presenters PollyAnn Huntington and Sylvia Roberts sharing their expertise with attendees.

Eventing WA made significant investments in new competition entry and scoring systems, as well as cellular scoring tablets, to enhance efficiency and accuracy. Riders now have access to preliminary dressage scores immediately after their tests, facilitating transparency and efficiency in event operations. Despite increased fuel expenses, efforts were made to renovate and maintain eventing portables, ensuring the safety and quality of competition facilities.

Sophie Wells - UK Multiple Paralympics Gold Medallist comes to WA to coach

Working in cooperation with Melissa Cannon from NSW, WA Para was privileged to host multimedallist para-athlete Sophie Wells in March 2023. Sophie coached our WA athletes and their horses for a full two days after which we joined her for dinner and an absolutely inspirational talk on the last evening of her visit. The WA Para-Equestrian Committee was delighted to support the work of Sharon Jarvis and Suzin Wells to deliver this opportunity to our athletes and we were able to provide a \$100 travel voucher for athletes to help with the cost of petrol to attend.

Classification

WA had eight (8) athletes Classified/ re- Classified in August 2023 at our WA Classification weekend. Additionally, Suzin Wells was Classified FEI Grade 4 at the Australian Dressage Championships, Boneo in October 2023.

Australian Dressage Championships and CPEDI Sharon Jarvis, Suzin Wells and Chelsea De Jonge travelled to Boneo Vic to compete at the Australian Dressage Championships.

WA's Olympic medallist, Sharon Jarvis PLY competed on two horses as she warms up for her tilt at Paris Para Olympic team. She also has arranged for a brilliant new partnership between the remarkable stallion, Lord Lamarque (owned by Jade Edwards and Alan Moody) and athlete Stella Barton in the FEI 3* Grade 1 CPEDI.

Chelsea and her new partner Don Dancier (owned by Gill Botten) won FEI 3* Grade 5 Championship. Her achievements in many east coast competitions have been outstanding and this team is definitely one to watch heading into Paris Para Selection and World Equestrian Games. After becoming a bilateral amputee 10 weeks prior to the Australian Dressage Championships, Suzin Wells completed her first national and international competitions and went on to win the FEI 2* Grade 4 Medium Freestyle by over 10%. What an achievement; we know there is more to come! Suzin is now a member of the National High Performance squad for para dressage.

Clinics

Suzin was one of 40 attendees who participated in an off-horse camp conducted by Para Olympic Coach Chris Nunn at Essendon Football Club over 3 days in November 2023. This was organised by Equestrian Pathways Australia.

WA athlete Sian Glanney rode a horse organised via EPA to compete in the Off the Track Magic Millions in QLD. Her show jumping was outstanding on a horse she had only 2 rides on before the invitation to travel to QLD.

Regionally based (Demark) para athlete, Andrew Forbes with his wonderful big red partner, Royal Magic previously competed at the Australian Dressage Championships (2022) and this year has announced his retired from competition. After speaking to Andrew recently it is clear that he has so very much to continue to offer our sport in WA as he completes his qualification in Equinology Body Work and continues to judge and coach in the Great Southern.

Promoting and Growing Para Sport in WA

The WA Para Panel organised a sausage sizzle at Horseland Midland to celebrate the National Day of Disability. Thanks to Cheryl Campbell for allowing us to work from her wonderful business! Funding provided through a grant from the Department for Communities, Disability Services, this event was high profile in our community and showcased para equestrian pathways, athletes and assistive technology that is available while raising awareness of Para-Equestrian sport.

WA is growing our sport every week!

For example, newly classified para athlete Danielle Loizou-Lake and her partner, BML Jack Sparrow recently started to compete and show huge potential for the future. Danielle is a most welcome addition to our sport and in her profession has represented Australia on a world platform by attending a conference at the UN in New York on the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

A key component of our pathways work is to link into NDIS and other supports. This year, Suzin Wells has helped WA athletes to unlock NDIS funding to support and expand participation in para sport. We hope to expand this work.

The season featured three major events: the Autumn Pageant & Newcomers, Winter Gala, and the landmark 50th Anniversary of Equestrian WA Horse and Rider of the Year (HOTY). The HOTY event, in particular, held special significance as it was also recognised as the 2023 EWA Annual Awards, Event of the Year. These events provided platforms for riders and horses to demonstrate their skills and compete at the highest levels.

Among the standout performers were Don Desandro, Cimeron Silver Lining, Asharley Valentino, and BL Bellissimo, who captured attention with their exceptional performances at the Supreme Autumn Pageant. Similarly, Don Desandro, Kingsfield Nobleman, Mallawa Park Hashtag, and Petite E'Toile showcased their talent and versatility at the Supreme Winter Gala. At the EWA HOTY, a National qualifier held in Sydney, WA riders excelled, with notable achievements including Petite E'Toile as OTT Runner-up and Contredance securing Small Hunter Galloway honours.

Off-horse developments played a crucial role in enhancing the overall experience for participants and spectators alike. The Show Horse Committee organised a successful Les Friend clinic, inviting squad members to participate and providing opportunities for skill development and knowledge-sharing. This clinic, which saw a total of 43 lessons completed over three days, received positive feedback and contributed to the growth and improvement of riders and horses alike.

In addition to the clinic, the committee hosted a judges' seminar aimed at fostering the development of judges within the community. This initiative was part of a broader effort to enhance the professionalism and expertise of officials, ensuring fair and consistent judging standards across events.

A key focus for the Show Horse Committee in 2023 was promoting a positive and supportive environment for volunteers and competitors alike. Initiatives such as the Horseland WA Volunteer of the Month Award and recognition for exemplary conduct among competitors helped foster a sense of camaraderie and sportsmanship within the community. Additionally, efforts to raise awareness of welfare issues and promote friendly behaviour among competitors led to tangible improvements in conduct and behaviour throughout the season.

Vaulting



The 2023 Vaulting season in Western Australia unfolded as a thrilling chapter filled with growth, achievement, and vibrant participation. From local showcases to prestigious championships, vaulters, horses, and their supporters demonstrated unwavering dedication and passion, making it a memorable year for the sport.

Throughout the year, the vaulting community showcased their skills and talents at various events. The Equestrian WA Interschool Vaulting Championships held in April attracted sixteen (16) vaulters, each displaying remarkable athleticism and finesse. Notable performances included Yindi Falconbridge's impressive victory in the Intermediate Individual category and Emmi Kneale's exceptional display in the Novice Individual category. The event provided a platform for young vaulters to showcase their abilities and set the stage for future success.

In October, a consort of six (6) vaulters, accompanied by vaulting horse Mackerson, travelled interstate to compete in the South Australian State Vaulting Championships. The WA team's stellar performance, including Yindi Falconbridge's first-place finish in the Intermediate Individual (Freestyle) category and Olivia Barry's victory in the Pre-Novice Individual category, highlighted the strength and talent of WA vaulters on a national stage. The team's success was a testament to their hard work, dedication, and the support of their coaches and supporters.

Off-horse initiatives played a crucial role in advancing the sport's development and inclusivity. WA vaulting judge Abbie White's successful attainment of Level 2 Equestrian Australia Judge Accreditation was a significant milestone, enhancing the judging expertise available within the state. Additionally, the establishment of the WA Vaulting Working Group in November marked a new chapter in the governance and strategic direction of Vaulting in WA. Comprising six (6) dedicated representatives, the working group aims to drive initiatives that promote growth, development, and inclusivity within the sport.

The incorporation of vaulting into the revised EWA Annual Award Policy in December 2023 further underscores the sport's growing recognition and importance. These amendments will enhance wider recognition for the discipline and provide opportunities for further engagement and promotion of our sport.



The implementation of a new rule regarding the removal of side reins during competition, prior to the judges' salute for Vaulting in Australia, reflects ongoing efforts to prioritise horse welfare and enhance the overall vaulting experience. This rule adjustment received widespread support and is expected to contribute to the continued welfare and development of vaulting horses in competition settings.

In addition to rule changes, WA vaulting clubs and organisations continued to foster a welcoming and inclusive environment for vaulters of all ages and abilities. Strong partnerships with local clubs, including RDA Carine, RDA Oakford, and HorsePower Australia, have provided valuable opportunities for vaulters with disabilities to participate and excel in the sport. These initiatives have not only expanded access to vaulting but also fostered a sense of community and camaraderie among participants.

One standout story from 2023 was the journey of WA's most advanced vaulter, Matilda Yates, who travelled to Europe for advanced training and participation in international vaulting championships. Her experiences abroad have contributed to the global awareness and appreciation of vaulting as a sport.

Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2015.

The financial report covers Equestrian Western Australia Inc as an individual entity. Equestrian Western Australia Inc is an association incorporated in Western Australia under the Associations Incorporation Act 2015.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the economic entity in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Income tax

Equestrian Western Australia Inc is a not for profit association and management has self-assessed that its operations are exempt from income tax under the provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act (1997) as amended.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs are assigned on a first-in first-out basis.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

a) Property

Freehold land and buildings are measured on the fair value basis, being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable willing parties in an arm's length transaction.

The revaluation of freehold land and buildings has not taken account of the potential capital gains tax on assets acquired after the introduction of capital gains tax.

b) Plant and equipment

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining the recoverable amounts.

c) Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised leased assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful lives to Equestrian Western Australia Inc commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Properties held for investment purposes are not subject to a depreciation charge. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

Employee entitlements

Provision is made for the liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount. Other employee entitlements payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash out flows to be made for those entitlements.

Contributions are made by Equestrian Western Australia Inc to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

Equestrian Western Australia Inc does not have an employer established defined benefit superannuation scheme.

Equestrian Western Australia Inc does not operate an ownership-based remuneration scheme, nor any similar scheme.

Cash

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash includes cash on hand and in all call deposits with banks or financial institutions, investments in money market instruments maturing within less than two months, net of bank overdrafts.

Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking in to account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established. Dividends received from associates and joint venture entities are accounted for in accordance with the equity method of accounting.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

Volunteer services are not recognised in the financial statements.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Government Grants

Grants from the government are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and the group will comply with all attached conditions.

Deferral and presentation of government grants

Government grants relating to costs are deferred and recognised in profit or loss over the period necessary to match them with the costs that they are intended to compensate.

Leases

EWA's lease of the State Equestrian Centre from the City of Swan is recognised at its contract value.

Subsequent Event(s)

To the best knowledge of the Equestrian Western Australia Directors, there has not been any material change in the financial position of Equestrian Western Australia since 31 December 2023.

Going Concern

A. Reliance on continued government support

EWA receives grants from the WA Government Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries ('DLGSC') to support equestrian sport activities and for capital improvements of the SEC, including the following upgrades/ improvements:

2022: commencement of the indoor arena surface upgrade and fire emergency services, and

2023: completion of the indoor arena surface upgrade, fire emergency services, lighting upgrades. Commencement of solar panel installation and main switchboard upgrade (completed in 2024).

Subsequent to 31 December 2023, EWA has further received \$400,000 plus GST to fund the following upgrades / improvements: switchboard upgrades, replacement of indoor arena emergency doors, replacement of certain lighting poles and LED lights and other miscellaneous expenditure in accordance with the SEC Asset Management Framework.

Continued support from the State Government is required for the organisation to continue its current level of operations and activities. The Board is currently unable to determine the level of Government support going forward.

B. Lease of Land (lot 43 on Plan 15100 and Lot 31 on Plan 15620)

EWA's lease of the State Equestrian Centre from the City of Swan will expire on the 31 December 2024. The Board intends to renew the SEC lease and has no indication the City of Swan will not extend the lease, nor that the terms of a lease would be more onerous than those currently incurred.

During 2022 and 2023, EWA along with their appointed independent consultants continued to further investigate opportunities for the SEC. EWA is liaising with the City of Swan, Department of Local Government, Sport and Culture and other key stakeholders on the future prospects for the State Equestrian Centre and investigating further commercial opportunities for the centre. This project is continuing in 2024.

C. Equestrian Australia Limited

The board of Equestrian Australia Limited is investigating restructure options for equestrian sports in Australia. Some of the proposed options may have an effect on the operations of Equestrian Western Australia Inc in the future.

Conclusion

Due to the items stated above, there is a material uncertainty related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the entity's ability to continue as a going concern. The entity may therefore be unable to realise its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business.
